Junior Achievement of Rhode Island is pleased to share with you the Student, Teacher, and Exhibitor Participation Summary of our 2022 JA Inspire program. This year, we were excited to have JA Inspire in-person, at the Rhode Island Convention Center, for the first time since 2019.

We would like to thank everyone who helped to re-launch this experience for our young people in Rhode Island. It was an extraordinary effort by all involved. The work we have done over the last 18 months has helped lay the groundwork for the future of this program. Thank you to the members of this taskforce for their insight and feedback.

Rhode Island continues to face labor market challenges, and we believe that there is no better time to help young people align their passion, talents, skills, and competencies to their future career. JA's focus is to help students become work and career ready. We do this by helping them understand the relevance of what they are learning in school and how it connects to future success. 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JA Inspire Program Overview

JA Inspire is more than a Career Exploration Fair, it brings together the business community and local middle schools and is designed to help launch these students into their futures: high school, college, and careers beyond. The program consists of three segments: 1) in-class sessions presented by the classroom teacher; 2) the hands-on JA Inspire expo; and 3) an in-class debrief. During the JA Inspire expo, students participate in hands-on activities, often using equipment or tools used on a job. The multi-hour experience is configurable to align with local industry, education, and career opportunities.








- Going inside the B.A.T. Mobile

Teacher Survey Feedback and Recommendations (cont'd.)

"What was the highlight of your JA Inspire Experience?"

- The highlight of my JA Inspire experience was seeing my students engaged in learning more about industries they showed interest.
- I liked how all of the material was provided for you and the lessons were easy to follow.
- The students were really engaged at the actual event. Students liked talking with employers and other students (from different schools). Students also liked researching careers they were interested in, during the pre-work before the event.
- Seeing the students interact with representatives from a wide variety of different industries was great. They loved the hands-on approach and have been talking about it since the event.
- Proudly watching students interact with the adult exhibitors. Seeing the excitement when they received a stamp and/or a free goodie.
- Seeing students who are normally reserved during school, participate with the vendors.
- My students didn't want to leave!! It was great seeing them interact with careers that they weren't even thinking of to help them stimulate things that they will plan for themselves.
- It was engaging and extremely organized.

"Do you have any additional comments or suggestions?"

- It would be nice to have the exact date/time ahead of time so the schools can plan better. There was also a little confusion once we arrived with the bus driver and then going home we were short a bus. Overall, the program was great and we are looking forward to it next year. I am trying to get the high school to participate and have a table at the fair next year. Thank you for all of your hard work with this.
- I would like to see more displays of CTE/CTC programs for students to apply to for high school. They need to know that there's more options than their neighborhood school.
- It was difficult to stick with my group of students, as most of them had different interests. Next time, I would require them to buddy up and stick with at least one other student for the entirety of the fair. I also found that most of my students ran out of energy and motivation to continue to explore after about 1 hour. 90 minutes might be a bit too much time for exploration.

- I think moving to a 3-day model would help accommodate the traffic between exhibits and give exhibitors more time with students.
- I thought the event was executed incredibly well this year. The flow of the students seemed steady. And, I heard some other folks say they loved the holding area & bussing system. Love the improvements!
- A gender-neutral bathroom would be beneficial and supportive for vendors and visitors!
- You all did a great job from my viewpoint. Looking forward to next year!
- We suggest No sunglass giveaway, because we cannot see Kids eyes and would like to know if
 they are involved in the trade field, we are currently showing them or not; Thursday (2nd day)
 should be night show, the kids should bring their parents to the JA Inspire Career Fair; All
